

METERED DOSE INHALER

How to Use Your Metered Dose Inhaler with Holding Chamber and a Mouthpiece



What is a Metered Dose Inhaler (MDI)?

A MDI, or inhaler, is a device that contains asthma medicine. It delivers the medicine into the lungs. The MDI needs to be used in the correct way in order to work.

What is a spacer?

A spacer is a plastic tube that connects to the MDI. The spacer helps more of the medicine get into the lungs to help your child.

If your child uses the MDI without a spacer, a lot of the asthma medicine can stick to

the tongue and throat instead of going to the lungs, wasting the medicine and decreasing its effectiveness.

How should I instruct my child to use the MDI with spacer?

- 1. Wash your hands well.
- 2. Sit up straight or stand to use MDI.
- 3. Remove the cap from the inhaler.
- 4. Shake the inhaler well before using it each time. If it is a new inhaler or has not been used in several days, follow the manufacturer instructions for priming the inhaler.
- 5. Attach the inhaler to the spacer.
- 6. Put mouthpiece into mouth and close lips around it to ensure an effective seal.
- 7. Breathe out gently and press the MDI at the beginning of a slow inhalation. Breathe in slowly and deeply through the mouth until a full breath has been taken. Hold breath for 10 seconds.

 Slow down inhalation if you hear a whistling sound. Administer one puff at a time, waiting one minute between puffs.

More tips

- Have your child rinse his mouth out with water or brush his teeth if the medicine was a
 corticosteroid, such as QVAR or Flovent. This step is not necessary with the use of albuterol.
- For cleaning, take apart and wash your child's spacer and mask with mild dish soap and water weekly. Allow to air dry. DO NOT dry with a cloth.
